Big Roman Dig! KS2 Session at Flag Fen



Flag Fen is recognised as the finest Bronze Age archaeological site in northern Europe. The Fen Causeway, a Roman Road, runs through the site. The road proved a strategic route leading up to the uprising against the Roman Empire in 60AD.

This 'Big Roman Dig' day explores the role of archaeology as a way of finding out about the past and understanding a different way of life. To build your day, choose two of the afternoon activities which best fits your school topic.

Morning Activities

Be an Archaeologist



Pupils will dig in our indoor simulated excavation pits and use a variety of excavation tools and techniques to dig and discover real and replica Roman artefacts and explore what these tell us about the past.

Please note that we use clean, shredded recycled rubber in our dig pits. The rubber reacts in the same way as soil, but creates an obviously much cleaner and healthier environment to work in.

Afternoon Activities

Choose 2 of the following activities for your afternoon:

Option 1: Meet Boudica

Pupils will meet Boudica in the roundhouse and will hear her account of the story and how the Roman occupation is impacting on the local community. They will be told of her plans to fight back and that she is after new recruits to the Iceni army. Pupils will handle real and replica Iron Age and Roman artefacts as Boudica describes what it is like to live in these times.



Option 2: Be a Roman Potter

Pupils will have hands-on experience at making a replica Roman pot inspired by our Roman pottery collection. They will develop an understanding of how industrialisation, with a particular focus on the pottery industry, contributed to the success of the Roman Empire. Pupils will also learn about the significance of the Roman pottery industry to the local area and what it tells us about Roman life.



Option 3: Meet a Roman

Pupils will meet the Roman governor, Gaius Suetonius Paulinus, by the original Roman road at that crosses Flag Fen and will hear his account of the story and of the events that led up to this rebellion. More recruits to the Roman army are needed. Pupils will handle real and replica Roman artefacts as the soldier describes what it is like to live in these times and will take part in some essential training drills.

National curriculum links: History, English, Science, Art.

Learning objectives:

Participating in the 'Big Roman Dig' day, pupils will:

- Develop a chronological understanding of the changes in Britain from the Iron Age to Roman period.
- Consider the impact of the spread of the Roman Empire in Britain.
- Gain historical understanding in relation to how we find out about the past through experimental archaeology and the use of primary sources.
- Understand the importance of strong military tactics for the Roman Army.
- Learn about Boudica and her role in British resistance.
- Understand historical concepts such as significance; continuity and change; cause and consequence and similarity and difference.
- Show an understanding that science is, and always has been used in the real world.
- Deduct statements and inferences from evidence.
- Improve mastery in sculpture techniques using clay.

Duration:	Full day: 10 am–2 pm.
Cost:	£292 + VAT for groups of 26-32 pupils £276 + VAT for groups of 21-25 pupils £262.50 + VAT for groups of up to 20 pupils Cost includes admission charge, all activities, supporting adults and a pre-visit. Minimum charge for school groups with less than 20 students: £262.50 + VAT.
